**Mental health:** Students struggle with a variety of mental health issues, stemming from violence in schools, bullying, lack of acceptance, issues at home, etc.

**Vaping and Substance Use**: This is the issue that staff sees most frequently at the library and is one that needs to be dealt with daily.

**Caregivers** / **Parents**: Library staff does not have contact for caregivers. Some caregivers are problematic and add to violence issues at library.
